Paper Degradation: III

MECHANICAL WEAR AND TEAR: tears, rupture, holes, missing pieces, folding and creasing. With proper attention preservation can retard further deterioration. Appropriate storage and careful handling are always the first and most practical steps. [Ed. As with any collectible—the less you mess with it, the longer it lasts!]

The ideal conditions for paper are: 20 degrees Celsius constant temperature, 50% relative humidity, low light levels i.e.: 20 lux. [http://www.geocities.com/Athens/Crete/1555/page2.html]

I'd estimate I currently have some 20,000 currently, and they sit around in a cacophony of boxes, trays, drawers, and the like, located in cabinets, closets, and corners of both the house and the garage. Heck! I even have huge trays under the bed!
