A "bar" is pretty synonymous with a pub, however it refers to a long bar at which stools are arranged for sitting.

A "saloon" emphasizes tables where drinks are served, rather than at the bar.

If you find this confusing, try this: A pub, a bar, and saloon are pretty much the same thing. The only thing that differentiates them is the decor. All bars are pubs, not all pubs are bars. All saloons are pubs, not all pubs are saloons." [answers. Yahoo.com]
