MATCH TIPS for New Collectors

Where to get album pages and other collecting supplies. For pages to hold full books, try Larry Martin in AZ. For plastic see-thru pages go to Bob Goodyear in CA. For slitted pages for 3-ring binders, try Hobbymaster in Anoka, MN. They sell albums, too. Although the Long Beach MC store is now closed, Bob Hiller of CA still has used pages—slitted ones for 3-ring binders and for Beach albums, and sometimes sewn pages. I would assume that most other dealers also wind up with empty album pages at times—try John Williams, Mike Shapiro, Glen Lewis, Larry Ziegler, or Andre Godin of Canada.

Album covers? In addition to Hobbymaster, you can also get wide albums at Office Depot, but the best buy is at flea markets. For pliers to remove staples from matchbooks, write to Ralph Arnold, MA. For lists of who has what lists, contact RMS editor Mike Prero. For general information about the hobby and for historical info write to John Williams, OH, or Ralph Arnold. For photos of many hobby old-timers and some recent collectors, write to Glenn Lewis, PA. Need to order a case or a truckload of matches? Try Wayne Eadie, in Goldens Bridge, NY. Some clubs like Sierra-Diablo sell caddies of shucked matches for your trading stockpile—write to Warren Marshall.

The above is not a complete listing, so please don't yelp if I omitted you. I purposely didn't give addresses, so YOU can take the trouble to look up those folks in the club rosters or bulletins.

When shopping, keep an eye out for wallpaper or Contact paper that might have matchbooks on it. And with the Christmas season upon us, look out for Christmas cards which show matches. Last year, Hallmark had a Christmas tree matchbox ornament—look this year, but wait until after Christmas to buy it at 1/2 price. When writing to traders, tell them not only what kind of

covers you like, but also what kind you would prefer NOT to receive. Some smart mfrs. can use matchbooks very effectively by having their product used to make the matchcover. A firm called Lexide, which makes fabric-like book covers, had a 30s matchcover made of Lexide; the inside tells you all about it.
